### Railroad Festival Shows Off Museum's Potential

The 2nd Annual Central Coast Railroad Festival is in the books. It was highly successful and grew in stature and content from its first presentation in 2009. The Festival is laying the groundwork for a major railroad event and tourist attracter on the Central Coast of California. The Festival had 50 events and displays. The Rail Celebration at the Freight House included tours of the Historic Railroad District and the Emily Street Yard led by Museum President Brad LaRose and speeder rides which yielded more income than similar rides in 2009. Plans are being made to expand activities within and around the Freight House during the 2011 Central Coast Railroad Festival. The Freight House should be one of the Festival's anchor venues once the interior is available for displays and events.

Highlights of this year's Festival included a large turnout for the model railroad tours including a record crowd at SLORRM Director Andrew Merriam's home layout. The Amtrak Wine-Train excursions, concerts and history talks were well received. The Festival had an increase in out of town visitors and family participation.

### **Museum Presented** to Historical Society

Friday, October 8th, Brad LaRose and Aron Kahn presented to the Conference of California Historical Societies a talk and Power Point show about the history of railroading on the Central Coast, the development of SLORRM, its present status and its future. The presentation was well received by the society members and many of them were able to take the Historic Railroad District Walk of History tour on Saturday, October 9th.

The tours were 1 hour 15 minutes in length and included the Amtrak Depot, REA building, water tank, freight house, caboose and Emily Street Yard. Museum member Baron Smith facilitated the event as he is also a CCHS member.

# **CMC** Track Donation Finally Completed

On Saturday, October 16, 2010, a dedicated and hardy crew of seven Museum members embarked on the final phase of the prolonged CMC track donation project. The donation from the state prison resulted in the Museum acquiring approximately onehalf mile of track. This included the rails, track hardware, wooden ties and rock ballast. Initially, inmate work crews dismantled the track and delivered the rails and track hardware to the Museum storage facility at the San Luis Obispo Sears Yard. After that initial transport of rail, the work crews continued to dismantle the track, but it was up to museum volunteers to go to CMC, load and transport the track. As this project was extremely large, this has taken several years.

The removal of rock ballast was the final phase, although there may be some clean up of miscellaneous materials in the future. Ballast is the rock that goes under, between and on the sides of wooden crossties. It allows water flow through so that moisture does not cause the ties to rot. Ballast differs from gravel, in that it has been sifted to a uniform  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " diameter. There are no small rocks or sand to hold moisture or running water.

The work day started at 8:00 a.m. with a crew of: Howard Amborn, Ted VanKlaveren and his son Mark, Chris Hurd, Duane Powell, Glen Matteson and Brad LaRose. Howard dropped off his John Deere tractor before driving to the Emily Street Yard to pick up a United Rentals dump trailer. He returned to CMC and loaded ballast into the trailer. When he arrived at the display track in front of the Freight house, the load was dumped and he drove back to CMC for more.

At the display track, Duane Powell used his tractor to load ballast into the push car that Ted Van Klaveren and Tom Cooper had constructed. This modified push car/pick up truck bed vehicle is not beautiful; its beauty is in its function. It worked flawlessly. Once loaded, the crew pushed it along the track, stopping between each pair of ties. A chain fall, donated by Tom Cooper (who also donated the pick up truck bed/box), was used to raise the box. A precise amount of ballast was then dumped between the ties.

The crew used track jacks to level the track as the ballast was tamped into place, under and around the ties, using shovels, lining bars rakes and other assorted tools. After a long, hard day of work, ballast had been placed between the rails of approximately 200' of track. This was a good start, and a good initiation to this type of work for our track crew.

Future plans call for delivering the ballast rock with a dump truck prior to the work day. This will allow the entire crew to work on placing and tamping the ballast, making the process faster and more efficient. Once the ballast between the rails has been installed, the dump car will be modified to spread the next loads of rock to the ends of the ties. Ballast along the side walk will be kept in place by a *curb rail* that we will install.

# **Baldwin Locomotive Moved to Emily Street**



After being in storage in Northern SLO County for several years, The Museum's Baldwin 0-4-2T locomotive was moved to the Emily Street Yard in San Luis Obispo. On Friday, September 24, Museum members Brad LaRose, Tom Cooper and Karl Hovanitz along with Dwight Peterson, owner of *Dwight Peterson Low Bed Service*, a trucking company in Atascadero, California, accomplished the move. Dwight donated his time and use of his truck and hydraulic trailer for the move. Dwight placed narrow gauge track panels (sections of rail welded together) on his trailer. Using a winch and cable hooked to the coupler, he pulled the locomotive from the track on the ground onto the track on the trailer. This was a very smooth operation that saved the cost of hiring a crane for lifting the engine. Dwight and his truck arrived in San Luis Obispo at the Museum's Emily Street Yard, pulling in and backing to a temporary track ramp constructed by Chris Hurd, Tom Cooper and Brad LaRose. The unloading went quickly and without any problems. Once the locomotive was at ground level, on flat track and disconnected from the trailer winch cable, it needed to be moved approximately 10 feet closer to Pacific Coast Railway narrow gauge boxcar #706.

Without a switch engine available or the locomotive being under steam, Chris and Tom had to use lining bars to lever the locomotive down the track. Brad LaRose rode in the locomotive cab using the hand brake to bring the locomotive to a stop.

Given the Museum's constantly growing presence in the San Luis Obispo Historic Railroad District, and the upcoming Central Coast Railroad Festival involving Walk of History tours, this was a good time to bring the Baldwin locomotive #7 to it's new home in San Luis Obipso.

# Loren Nicholson Honored at Dallidet Adobe

On Sunday, September 26, 2010, local dignitaries, Museum members and members of the public gathered at the *Dallidet Adobe*, a city historical park, to pay tribute to *Loren Nicholson*, local author, historian and Cal Poly Journalism Professor Emeritus. The event was sponsored by the *Central Coast Railroad Festival* as a special preview and reception event. Loren is probably best known among Museum members and history buffs as the author of *Rails Across the Ranchos*, a 210 page, limited edition, his-

tory of railroading on the Central Coast in the nineteenth century.

Speakers lauding Loren for his many accomplishments included Jim Keating, President of the S LO Model Railroad Association, SLO Mayor Dave Romero, SLORRM President Brad LaRose, Ken Schwartz, former Mayor of SLO, Gary Hoving, President of the South County Historical Society and Craig Kreowski, President of the History Center of SLO County.
