The Great American Railroad Show will premiere in San Luis Obispo in late March 2011. This unique, steam powered live stage show will be presented at the Unity Theatre, 1490 Southwood Drive, on March 18, 19, 20, 25, 26 and 27. Showtimes are 7:00 pm on Fridays and Saturdays and matinees at 2:00 pm on Saturdays and Sundays. The show was been crafted by Writer/Creator Joe Burns and is co-produced by Curtis Reinhardt, Director of the Central Coast Railroad Festival. Joe is a Disney veteran and Curtis is a music and events industry professional. Theatre professional Jake McGuire will direct.

Welcome and "All Aboard" for The Great American Railroad Show! Train enthusiasts, theatre buffs and music fans will not want to miss this entertainment experience. It is a show that will be intriguing for adults of all ages as well as fascinating for younger family members. Every passenger on this theatrical railroad show will be served a full menu of railroad history and railroad humor. The performances will include dancing, singing, railroad films, movie clips and an old fashioned melodrama. Historical elements will be woven into the show including the creation of the Transcontinental Railroad as well as focuses on the Southern Pacific, Central Pacific, Union Pacific, Santa Fe and Disneyland Railroads. The program will be staged as a live radio show taping similar to "A Prairie Home Companion" with Garrison Keillor. Ten great singers and actors have been cast in the show.

The Great American Railroad Show will include a "preshow" environment in the lobby which will feature model railroads and exhibits about Central Coast railroad history. The SLORRM will offer an information table as well as display some artifacts and the Museum's Velocipede.

Museum Interior Construction Moves Ahead

Wednesday, December 29, 2010 marked a milestone for the San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum's interior construction program. With Museum President Brad LaRose in attendance, Museum Building Committee members John Marchetti and Andrew Merriam held a preliminary walk through with 4 potential contractors to discuss installing supplemental trusses so that the Museum can occupy the interior. This is a major step in occupying the building and converting it from a warehouse to a museum. The installation of these trusses allows us to hang the fire suppression systems (fire sprinklers), lighting and power as well as provide insulation at the roof level. The new trusses, while having the same configuration as the existing historical trusses, are to be painted black and have the bottom member raised about nine inches so that visually the historic open-shed character of the museum space will be retained. - see photos above.

In order to clean up the space prior to construction, our Saturday workday focused on clearing out the main floor. It was a great success, with a peak workforce of 14 helping to muscle the collection either to the Emily Street storage area and/or relocating it to the north end of the freighthouse for future evaluation and possible use. We have so much stuff, it's sort of exciting and exhausting.

The result of the bidding process was an award to RK Builders, Inc. of San Luis Obispo for the installation of the trusses which were fabricated by Hayward Building Systems of Santa Maria. Construction started in early

February, and will be closely followed by the Phase I installation of the fire sprinkler system.

Parallel to our effort is the City's commitment to complete the exterior ramp and railing system to meet safety and disability access standards as well as initiate work in the restroom area. At that point, City funding through the development block grants is complete. The Museum will then continue with tenant improvements using its own funds and donations from the Hind Grant.

Many Generous Donations Bolster Museum's Collection

• John Marchetti donated an original first style Amtrak uniform.

• Karl Hovanitz donated a 1925 SP book of "Instructions to Accountants," which will make a good display and archival item..

• Brad La Rose donated a slide projector and screen, a milk can, a coal hopper, coffee mugs, three spike malls, welding equipment and other railroad hardware.

• Cal Poly donated a 9' x 9' motorized projection screen which can be hung in the meeting area of the Museum.

• Tom Veronese donated three Western Union telegraphers' keys.

• The family of H. E. Hawley has donated his entire railroad collection to The Museum. This is the largest single



donation of artifacts that the Museum has received in a long time. It took eighteen pages of donation forms to record it all.

This large, extensive collection, is mostly SP and other western railroads. Mr. Hawley is a past member and a local resident. He bought stuff locally, so many of the SP pieces are from this area. Some of the items are: men at work signs, mileposts, street signs including "Espee Street," switch stand targets, a good photo of the old SLO roundhouse, a boiler inspection plate for SP 4444, two shovels stamped SP Co., a link and pin coupler, 14 lanterns, nine padlocks, dishes, bowls, SP sports team brass medallions labeled "SPAAU," Harriman employee awards, coffee mugs from SP, lots of lantern globes, 72 railroad postcards, a metal drinking cup marked SP Co., spoons and other flatware, SP Co. torch with wick, battery lantern from SP Police, wall-mounted caboose lights, Watsonville Junction Relief Train lantern which is a gem.

Work Day, January 8th

Construction is to begin very soon on the final construction phase of the 1894 Southern Pacific Railroad freighthouse restoration.

A crew of 10 museum members assembled in the freighthouse on Saturday, January 8, 2011. They moved or removed almost every artifact and many other items from inside the building. For the first time in many years, the floor is virtually void of stacked artifacts, etc. This had to be done so that the adding of new roof trusses, fire sprinkler piping and other rehabilitation related work can be accomplished. Many of the items were taken to the Emily Street Yard for storage until they can be restored and exhibited. A few items that are very heavy and difficult to move, were left on pallets. The museum recently purchased a pallet jack so that those heavy pallets could be moved easily during construction.

Future work days will involve our display track project. The next part of that project will involve moving more rock ballast from the California Men's Colony and placing it onto the track. Work at CMC is progressing on a new building and our time frame to obtain the rock ballast at that location will end in the near future.
